Dr. Geo. Wedel's Building Damage In Nashville Blast

Dr. George H. Wedel, eye doctor who for many years has had a branch office here, was in the center of a terrific butane gas explosion at Nashville a week ago Saturday.

Dr. Wedel told a Messenger reporter last Thursday that at the time the explosion he was in his office located in his own new building which is located in the center of two buildings that were demolished.

He said several patients were in his office at the time and that the experience was frightening.

He said he was conscious of a terrific force pressing in around him and then cracks began to spiderweb around the walls of his office.

Many were notified of the danger but he said the first intimation of danger was the blast.

He and his patients escaped injury. Doctor Wedel believes because his building was new and tight and the gas did not seep underneath his building as it did under the buildings that were demolished.

The air was so laden with the gas that a young lady walking near the demolished building a few minutes before the explosion lost her new shoes when they dissolved down to her feet.
